

Ending homelessness in Brisbane one person, one family at a time

### Campaign Outcomes 2014 – 2017

**500 Lives 500 Homes** is a community-wide collaborative effort to break the cycle of homelessness for families, young people and adults in Brisbane. The campaign began with a community-wide Registry Fortnight in March-April 2014, where we undertook to know each person who was homeless by name and survey their individual health, housing and support needs.

### Findings and Outcomes for Families with a Parent aged ≤24

We surveyed

parents aged 24 or under from **255** families with **270** accompanying children under 18

#### Parents surveyed

Of those surveyed and counted ...



255 young parents surveyed



**92**% identified as female



71% were sole parents



34% identified as Indigenous

### Children counted



accompanying children counted



additional children not accompanying parents



2 children (on average) under 18 in each family



91% of accompanying children were aged 0 to 5 years



Average age of parents was 21 years. Average age of children was 2 years. Average time families were homeless was 1.7 years.

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
The following data was collected during the 500 Lives 500 Homes campaign conducted from March 2014 – March 2017.

The data was based on 255 families, with a head of household aged under 25 years, surveyed using the Vulnerability Index Service Prioritisation Decision Assistance Tool (VI-SPDAT).

Many survey respondents identified one or more family members impacted by poor physical and/or psychosocial health. The families are identified below.

#### **Prioritising and Matching**

The VI-SPDAT enables needs to be determined using an acuity scale, which in turn enables us to appropriately triage for services that match those needs.



- Housing and long-term support (High Acuity)
- Housing and short-term support (Medium Acuity)
- Affordable Housing (Low Acuity)

### Health Needs Snapshot

When faced with homelessness, parents are often unable to access healthcare and support for every family member that needs it.

### **Primary Health**



44% Asthma



1% Heart



35% Substance Use

#### **Mental Health**



49% have experienced unresolved trauma in their lives



39% have been identified with tri-morbidity

(co-occurring mental health condition, substance use and serious health condition)



### Potential out-of-home-care

for families with a young parent aged under 25 years, surveyed through the 500 Lives 500 Homes campaign (2014–2017)

"My life has had a lot of bumps and challenges, but everything I've gone through has made me a stronger person.

I now tell people in trouble that there is a light at the end of the tunnel. I've seen it myself. Asking for help is not a failure. Sometimes you just need help, so don't be afraid to ask," Rebecca.

### Homelessness is solvable

We must connect people experiencing homelessness with long-term housing as quickly as possible and with no preconditions. Known as Housing First, this approach has propelled campaign successes and forms the basis of a community-driven action plan to eliminate homelessness in the city of Brisbane.
